 - NSS- Various competitions on social issues such as drug abuse and antitobacco were organized. Three Aids Day awareness campaign were organized Organ donation awareness programmes and blood donation campaigns were organized. Several drives aimed at cleaning the premises of public institutions were initiated. Road safety awareness programmes were also organized. Educational support programmes for SSLC students were conducted at GVHSS Kinassery. Several cleaning initiatives were also organized in the School premises. A massive cleaning drive was organized at the adopted village. A project called *Sujalam* was initiated to rejuvenate Mampuzha River. The NSS vigil help desk was set up in collaboration with Vigilance Department to assist the public who approach government offices for availing various services.

6.2 Does the Institution have a management Information System?

The institution maintains a website which is updated periodically. The college prospectus is provided to the students seeking admission to the institution. The institution also distributes a calendar every year that contains all information related to the college. Prompt responses are dispensed to queries raised through emails and telephonic calls. The institution also has an information counter.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

The institution is affiliated to the University of Calicut and follows the prescribed curriculum of the University. Members of the various Boards of Studies attend Board meetings and actively participate in curriculum restructuring. The curriculum for PhD course work and self financing course are designed by the faculty members of the college and later approved by the University. Two of our faculty contribute to the University education in their capacity as senate members.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

The faculty makes use of interactive teaching methods, assignments, projects, lectures, seminars by external experts, workshops, scholar support program, walk with scholar program and remedial measures to support and enhance the teaching learning process. Teaching plan, interactive session, continuous evaluation of exams and feedback from students are the quality ensuring initiatives. Special efforts are made to cater to the diverse needs of students to make the teaching learning process more inclusive. Linking curriculum with social issues is an ongoing practice.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

The institution monitors and ensures the achievements of learning outcomes through the conduct of class tests, internal examinations, seminars and power point presentations. The internal and external marks are displayed in the departmental notice boards. The Committee for CUCBCSS evaluation monitors the learning outcomes and reports to the IQAC.

6.3.4 Research and Development

The institution has five PG departments upgraded to research centres. The IQAC and the ZCIR have taken initiatives to provide information pertaining to research funds and assistance available from various funding sources. The ZCIR also motivates the faculty to take up fundamental research designed to address the various contemporary issues. The Research centre became fully functional with two museum, 5 labs and a fully digitalized class room. The five Research Departments of the college function at the Research centre. Sufficient space is provided to the Research Scholars

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

There is a centralized library with 64570 books. There are 481 reference books. There are 131 journals with a value of Rs.90202/-. The library advisory committee with the Principal as the chairperson, Librarian as the ex-officio secretary, representatives of the teaching faculty and chairperson of the students unions as members lay down the policy and programs for the functioning of the library. There are two Ladies Hostel with intake capacity of 350. The students Co-operative store serves both the staff and students. The college canteen provides food and refreshments to both staff and students. The fourteen labs including a well furnished Informatics lab ensure effective implementation of teaching through the use of modern equipments and devices. There are five seminars halls. Certain areas in the campus are under CCTV surveillance. The campus also has PNB extension counter and Post office.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

Community oriented extension programs are encouraged through the activities of the NSS, NCC and Pain and Palliative care Unit. Environmental protection camps and cleaning programs are organized by the two NSS units. A total of twenty one clubs with teachers as conveners function to enrich the co curricular and extracurricular interests of the students. The career guidance of the college provides unstinting support to the students through orientation programs and training sessions. The staff recreation club offers a platform for the staff members to interact relax and exhibit their inborn creative talents. Annual tours and celebrations on festive occasions are organized by the staff recreation club.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

The members of the faculty are selected by a duly constituted staff selection committee with the District Collector as the Government nominee. Selection is entirely on the basis of merit which in turn is based on the guidelines issued by the affiliated University. The recruitment of non teaching staff is done on the basis of directions of the Government of Kerala from time to time.
